Why do fellows choose to do a fellowship?

Reasons to consider a fellowship:

- You'd like the chance to further hone your surgical skills with one more year of training.
- You like the idea of differentiating yourself from your peers.
- You're competitive: the process to get into a fellowship isn't easy, and many of the strongest residents consider it.
- You see the value you'll receive in putting off going into practice for one more year.

Some reasons NOT to take on a fellowship:

- Residency training is enough.
- The cost is too high (postponing work and student loan repayment).
- Too competitive: not enough fellowships.
- The added value of a fellowship isn't enough.

How does fellowship differ from residency:

- What is the schedule/rotations like (office, surgery, clinic, rounding?
- Are there any pre/post fellowship exams/boards?
- How does the fellow's call schedule work?
- Does the fellow mainly scrub with the fellowship director, or multiple attendings?

Can you explain the different specialties:

- Foot and Ankle Reconstruction
- Sports Medicine
- Trauma
- Research
- Other? (i.e. non-surgical)

What about fellowships linked with residencies?

- How does this relationship work?
- Do you feel the fellow takes away from senior resident cases or do you see it as a learning experience?

What do directors look for in a fellow?

What do program directors look for in a fellow?

 Academic achievement: residency program ranking/history, research, outside activities/volunteer work

 Personal interview: presentation, communication skills, professional interaction, affability, common interests with attendings
